Create a fact file about a real life hero from the past or present that you find interesting	Sketch a portrait of a hero we have learned about in class. You could search for photographs online, in newspapers or in books to help you.	Write a recipe for a hero. Remember to include ingredients and method.	Use non-fiction books from school or the library and/or the internet to research a hero or villain from the past. Write a list of facts you have found out about them.
Listen to Heroes by David Bowie, We don't need another Hero by Tina Turner, Holding out for a Hero by Bonnie Tyler. Give each a rating from 1 to 5 and write a one line review for each.	Look at a range of children's picture books from home, school or the library. How many different heroes and villains can you find in them? Make a list of who you find and which book they were in.	Make Top Trump cards for heroes or villains in children's stories, fairy tales or films. Include their name, picture and a short description of each character. You could classify them by strengths, weaknesses, intelligence etc.	Imagine that you have performed a heroic act. What heroic act have you done? Write a newspaper report about it including a headline, picture of yourself and a recount of your heroic act.
Write a rap about a hero or villain you're interested in. Think about rhythm and rhyme. Be ready to perform!	Write an acrostic poem about a hero or villain of your choice from a book or a film.	Create your own villain. Give them a villainous name. What would be their villainous acts? Draw a picture of them in their villainous outfit.	Do a kind deed for someone at home. How did it make them feel after? How did it make you feel after?
